Fireside Chat With KB8NW

Fellow DXers,

The year 2019 is quickly coming to an end. For me there were low and high points during 2019. Let's start with the low (or bad) points of the year.



In January, I learned that the club's membership was down to about 32. This shocked me because I thought it was around 60, and at one time several years ago, it was close to 150. I know that in the past the membership usually fluctuated with the sunspot cycle, and I also know we have had several members become Silent Keys (SK). However, this is a big drop. We need to work on encouraging and recruiting new members for 2020 (especially younger individuals).

The second low point of the year was Field Day. According to the ARRL, nearly 1.1 million contacts were made during the 2019 ARRL Field Day, and NODXA wasn't in the event for 2019 because we could not have enough CW operators to participate. I hope this does not happen for 2020.

The above two low points are about the only major things I am concerned about other than maybe some more participation by club members.

Moving onto the good points of 2019. Over the last few years, NODXA's treasury has become fairly healthy due to some estate donations from the passing of members and donations by active members. This has caused the membership of NODXA to become generous in donating to more DXpeditions.

Over the last two years, NODXA has donated to 21 DXpeditions, nine DXpeditions for 2019 and two for 2020. I still feel that NODXA is still achieving its main purpose in promoting DX and funding DXpeditions.

The second good point for me in 2019, was meeting old friends from the past and learning that they still think very highly of NODXA. This occurred at the 2019 Day-Xenia HamVention with the reunion of our friends from Germany, Holger, DL7IO (now Zl3IO), XYL Birgit, DL7IQ (now ZL2YL) and their daughter Xenia, ZL4YL. We met up at the HamVention, and they later visited at the NODXA Hospitality Suite at the Crown Plaza. It was a 26 year reunion which started many years ago with past NODXA member Don Schmidt, N8AC/SK, and they still fondly remember NODXA. Birgit recently wrote an article about her first visit to the Dayton HamVention and mentions

NODXA in the article. Hopefully, it will be in this newsletter or the next.

As always, I hope to see you in the coming weeks/months, possibly at a ham-

the treasury balance was \$Ka-Ching! We spent a lot of money last month with donations and bills. No new members have joined. Bruce, N8DJX, moved and Rick, K8ZH, seconded that the treasurers report be approved and the motion passed. The repeater was reported as working fine. The new newsletter is done, after having been delayed by problems with a Windows 10 update of the editor's computer. The newsletter contained lots of pictures.

Old/New Business:

Tedd, KB8NW, stated that we received a nice thank-you letter from the Sisters of Charity of St. Augustine for our Field Day grounds usage fee. Rick, K8ZH,

Pete, N8TR, Mary, N8DMM, and Jim, K8MR, reported on taking down the tower with a SteppIR beam, owned by Fred, K8PP. Jim Galm, W8WTS, wanted the tower. Astronomers have predicted that the next solar cycle starting in 2021 will be even lower.

Wrap-up:

Bruce, N8DJX, moved and Gary, NI8Z, seconded that the meeting be closed, and the motion was passed on the vote. The next meeting will occur on October 7, 2019. No 50/50 raffle occurred. The meeting closed at 8:20 p.m.

What is Hamvention? By Xenia Berger, ZL4YL

So, I'm sure you are looking forward to the report from the world's largest amateur radio fair in Dayton Ohio. This was our big goal for this year's short vacation to the USA. A direct flight took place on May 15 this year, immediately after Sassi's graduation, from Auckland to Chicago. Since Holger and I were only there in 2017, we only looked for things we didn't know, such as the <u>John Hancock Center</u>,



where there is a 360° viewing platform on the 94th floor. The hit, however, is the so-called <u>tilt</u> You stand on the edge of the window and are then folded outwards by 30° . You have to have good nerves and trust in the system, because the view down to the street is completely clear.



After a quick run through Chicago and some rain, we drove a rental car to Dayton, Ohio, where we got hold of a room at the Crown Plaza Hotel with some good relationships. The parties and club events

always take place there in the evenings and you don't want to have to walk far. The <u>Dayton Fair</u> has been around since 1952, at that time in the Biltmore Hotel. In 1964 they moved to the Hara Arena in



Dayton. Everyone felt very comfortable there and therefore one was very disappointed when it was closed in 2017 for reasons of age. The new place is Xenia, yes you heard right, written exactly like our Ixi.

The number of visitors to the fair fluctuates between 20,000 and 30,000. This year it should have been 28,000. So why is it now called <u>Hamvention</u>? Ham is actually called ham in German, so it's just a nickname for an amateur radio operator, no idea why. Convention is the English word for event and both are composed of <u>Hamvention</u>.



What do you do at the Hamvention? First of all you will find all providers of amateur radio technology, such as radios or antennas. Then there are the clubs and interest groups, from the American Radio Association (ARRL) to robot technology for children and adolescents. The variety is enormous and

very varied. Then there is the huge area of the flea market, where you can find used technology of all kinds (including computer accessories, components, technology cases, and much more). Occasionally you come across a stand with jewelry or handicrafts for the spouses.



In addition, all possible lectures and forums are offered in the various halls. For example, one forum was dedicated to young people. Here Ixi was allowed to listen for 10 minutes with a (here with link) Lecture and then the children were showered with gifts. We had to buy an extra suitcase for this.



As already mentioned, after the day's program at the trade fair, it goes straight to the hotel and I can tell you we didn't sleep much. We met a lot of interesting people from all over the world (it was especially nice to meet old friends from the Northern Ohio DX Foundation after all these years) and had a lot of good conversations. I was only there for the second time after 1993, but it was awesome again and highly recommended.

After two and a half days (in very good weather) the show was over and we continued towards Indianapolis, but there is not enough space for that. To be continued:). See you soon.

What Actually is the Dayton Hamvention? By Birgit Berger, ZL2YL

Prologue:

26 years ago, a young YL and her partner went to the Dayton Hamvention for their first time ever. In their luggage was a lot of curiosity, excitement and a big portion of nervousness as they were not

just there to visit the worlds biggest amateur radio fair, but to give a speech at the DX forum.

The Dayton Hamvention is not just a gigantic event with hundreds of exhibition stands and an even bigger flea market, it is three days packed with forums, presentations and simply walking around and meeting a lot of kindred spirits from all over the globe. On top of that, there are many banquets, dinners and radio club parties in the good old Crown Plaza Hotel (Stouffers at the time).

The Dayton Hamvention history dates back to 1952 when it was held in the Builtmore hotel. From 1964 till 2017, the venue was the Hara Arena in Dayton. There were a lot of sad faces when everything had to be moved to Greene County Fair-

grounds in Xenia (Ohio), however, the Hara Arena building had just aged too much and was therefore closed for renovation.



In May (17-19) 2019, we finally visited Dayton Hamvention again, this time a bit more experienced and relaxed. This may have also been due to the fact that we handed over the speaker responsibility to our daughter Xenia; this year it was her turn to give a speech (at the Youth forum). She was particularly thrilled to get the chance to visit a city that has the same name as her. It was also the year with the

biggest attendance ever, with 32,472 visitors being counted.

So what did we do and see this time?

1. Although the official start of the event was on Friday, lots of people arrived there by Wednesday. The reason for this was the "Contest University" as an additional activity before the main event. The pro-



gram was packed with top-class presentations. Many of them featured technical topics that weren't just of interest to contesters. They are available for download (files and videos can be found here: < http://www.contestuniversity.com).

As usual, the indoors expo hosted the 'who is who' in Amateur Radio technology and you could find their latest state-of-the-art product releases.



One of them was the new K4 SDR transceiver from Elecraft where everything is about easy remote access and connectivity. Three models of the K4 will be made available approximately by the end of 2019. All of them will be direct sampling radios (160-6m, 100W) but still with a conventional user interface an

antenna tuner and an extension slot for a future UHF/VHF transverter. Both K4D and K4HD will have a second independent receiver.

Yaesu introduced the new FTDX101D transceiver (160-4m, 100W, antenna tuner). The radio has a hybrid receiver with direct sampling and small band SDR in the first IF stage. The 200 W version is called FTDX101MP.



Also from YAESU is the hand held radio FT3DE (2m, 70 cm, 5W) for analog FM and the digital voice mode C4FM. An inbuilt GPS module allows APRS operation.

Flex Radio released the "Multiflex". This is the new Software (version 3) for their SDR's. It allows two operators the simultaneous access and operation of a flex radio. By doing so they can be in different locations at the same time.



Icom presented the UHF/VHF SDR IC9700 with the same form factor as the IC7300 plus the IC-V86 a MIL-spec IP67 portable handheld radio.

If you are one of the high-tech SDR fans, you need to check out the MB1 from Expert Electronics. This one combines a PC and a top notch SDR in one box.

3. At the huge flea market, you had to be careful not to get lost. Whatever you were looking for, there was a good chance that you'd find it there. Besides the obvious amateur radio gear and all sorts of antennas, there was also a lot of IT equipment, travel cases, jewelry, handicrafts - we even found a booth with hand made swing chairs.



4. If you want to visit the Hamvention, you should make a plan on what you are actually interested in, as there were many presentations and forums which share the same time slot.

A big crowd was usually found at the DX forum, the Antenna forum or the contesting forum but forum a large part of the event this year was naturally the Youth forum. Together with a few other kids, Xenia

had a 10 minute speaker slot to fill which she did very well. Afterwards, the kids were buried under heaps of freebies and generous donations. There were also a couple of other activities like the Ham Radio Workbench or Robotics in the classroom lecture that engaged the youth and hence the next generation of Ham Radio operators. We hugely enjoyed meeting a big number of young people; some were even from New Zealand.

5. As I mentioned before, there was also a big number of affiliated events in and around Dayton. Many groups who shared the same interests got together in the evenings. For DXers and contesters the Crown Plaza Hotel in Dayton was the center of gravity. Every night a few hundred people met there for Context / DX / Top Band banquets and diners till late. You could finally associate faces to some legendary callsigns you have only heard on the bands previously. Some radio clubs hosted gatherings in the suites upstairs like the Kansas City DX Club who runs a CW pileup competition each year that attracts a lot of people.



My personal highlight was to meet our old friends from the Northern Ohio DX Association who had adopted us in 1993 as part of their own and who welcomed us whole-heartedly again in 2019. We all looked a bit older and the party was a bit shorter but we still had a great time.

Epilogue:

Very sleep deprived but with lots of new impressions and good memories, we returned back home to Napier. Here we heard the sad news that a big tornado had gone through Dayton and its surroundings which had entirely destroyed the Hara Arena on May 28.

Hamvention 2020 is planned for May 15-17. So go ahead: be there and be part of the fun - it is worth it Smile.

Can you copy at 20 WPM by Hand? by Dan Romanchik, KB6NU

About a month ago, this email from the ARRL was send to the CWOps mailing list:

Greetings Morse Code Enthusiasts.

I have some exciting news that I want to share with you! The ARRL has reinvigorated the W1AW Code Proficiency Certificate program. Several things have changed beginning with our new sponsor, Vibroplex, a legend in Morse telegraphy equipment. If you see Scott Robbins W4PA and the Vibroplex

team at a hamfest or convention please be sure to thank him for his support. The Vibroplex logo will appear on the newly designed certificates (see below) and in the award recipient page that will appear every month in QST.

That's right, each month in QST we will publish the most recent recipients of the W1AW Code Proficiency Certificate, beginning with all the 2019 recipients. As a bonus, we are sending all the 2019 CPC holders a new certificate at no cost to replace their older style award.

The award is available to anyone who copies one solid minute of code during the qualifying runs. Complete program details can be found on the web at http://www.arrl.org/code-proficiency-certificate.


And to make the award available to more people we will double the number of opportunities to copy the CW text. Beginning September 2019, the qualifying runs will increase from twice per week to four times per week.

I am sharing this advanced notice with the Morse code clubs so that you can share it with your members. I have attached PDF files of the new certificate and the announcement that will appear in August QST, available in digital format July 8. I hope you are as excited about this as I am.

In closing, I want personally thank all of you who promote the use and proficiency of Morse code on the air waves and ask that you challenge your club members to submit their copy for the W1AW Code Proficiency Certificate.

Almost immediately after I posted this to my blog (at <u>KB6NU.Com</u>), my friend, Paul, KW1L, replied, "How does one copy legibly at 40 wpm?" When I replied, "Typing," he countered, "On page 98 of the July 2019 QST, it says, 'Legibly copy at least 1 minute of text by HAND...'"

To this, I replied, "Well, I guess you and I are both screwed then. I can't copy by hand at 20 wpm, and it's really not worth it to me to practice and get that fast. I'm guessing that I'm not alone in this regard. The upshot is that the ARRL is going to be sending out a lot fewer of these Vibroplex certificates than they think."

I then emailed W3IZ for a clarification. He shot back, "By hand is to mean not using a code reading machine." I suggested that he clarify this, both on the ARRL website and in QST. Of course, they haven't yet taken my suggestion, and the website still reads, "Copy one of W1AW's qualifying runs and submit one minute of solid copy (legible)."

When will the Robots take over? by Dan Romanchik, KB6NU

It's inevitable. At some point, machines are going to render humans irrelevant. It's been a recurring theme in science fiction since before I was born (1955), and there are numerous predictions of the Singularity, the point in time when machines will be smarter than human, occurring between 2030 and 2045.

It may happen in amateur radio sooner than we think. A couple of days ago, one of my readers, sent me a link to a blog post by John, AE5X: <u>Automated FT8 "FoxBot" in upcoming DXpedition</u> dition - confirmed. He wrote:

"A <u>DXpedition to Tokelau</u> will take place from 1 to 11 October and it will be your chance to work an FT8 robot operating in Fox/Hound mode. "Stathis SV5DKL has been working on a "FoxBot" for some time now, is listed as a partner to this DXpedition and has confirmed that the DXpedition will be using his FoxBot."


John has since updated this post, noting "The SV5DKL logo has now been removed and the DX team will be in 'full compliance' with the mode." Full compliance meaning following the rules set up by the ARRL DXCC rules.

The ARRL is, of course, against the use of robots. A recent ARRL Letter noted:

"ARRL has incorporated changes to the rules for all ARRL-sponsored contests and DXCC, prohibiting automated contacts and requiring that an actual operator is initiating and carrying out a contact. These changes also apply to Worked All States (including Triple Play and 5-Band WAS), Fred Fish W5FF Memorial, and VUCC awards. The changes are effective immediately and affect the rules for both HF contests, and VHF/UHF contests as well as DXCC.

"A resolution at the July ARRL Board of Directors meeting pointed to 'growing concern over fully automated contacts being made and claimed' for contest and for DXCC credit. The rules now require that each claimed contact include contemporaneous direct initiation by the operator on both sides of the contact. Initiation of a contact may either be local or remote."

As AE5X says, however, the use of FT8 robots in the future is a certainty.



Sooner or later, some DXpedition is going to use an FT8 robot without saying anything about it. How is the ARRL going to know that a DXpedition is using robots if the DXpedition operators don't tell them?

I'm wondering when some DXpedition is going to give up on SSB and CW altogether. Why bother with those modes when you can make hundreds or thousands more contacts by just operating FT8?

Another thought just occurred to me. If the ARRL gets its way and Techs are awarded HF digital privileges, how long will it take for some enterprising Tech to make the DXCC Honor Roll using FT8 exclusively. Oh, the horror of it all!

New Ham Radio Dating Service Emerges via hamhijinks.com

Grindle's team of crack coders/hams sprung into action and the site was able to launch just two days after the lovebird holiday at www.1-to-1.perfect50ohm-YL-match.com. "We've had a huge response!" cited Grindle. "Apparently I'm not the only successful and single ham radio op out there looking for that special YL to fill my shack!"

"Maybe you don't want to go solo on the long car ride to Dayton, or perhaps you would just like the warm company of a fine lady at the local club meeting at Denny's. If so, well then buddy, this site is for you!" claims Grindle with his used car salesman-styled pitch.

Unlike many dating websites, Gridle's matching service doesn't really use any algorithms at all. "Basically, if you're a lady, and a ham radio operator... well... that's plenty."

Users are invited to first start with a text-based "QSO" through the site's servers. If they seem to be resonant, they're encouraged to have a live video-chat "Eyeball QSO." Those that really arc-over may even opt to meet in person.

Grindle concedes that the site seems to be a bit lacking in a vital element. "We have some 30,000 registered members since just last Monday, but only... well... we have just two YLs."
